

Majority of charter LEAs have interest in a city-owned building


LEAs reporting interest in city-owned buildings


Expansion is the most common reason for interest in a city-owned building


Charter Schools are Housed in a Wide Variety of Facility Types


Leased and owned facilities


Nearly a quarter of charter school facilities do not support the school's academic mission

Current facility supports the school's academic mission




80 percent of facilities are easily accessible by public transportation

Facility is easily accessible by public transportation




30% of charter schools do not agree that indoor quality of facilities is comfortable for students

Indoor quality is comfortable for students




More than half of charter schools have concerns about the condition of their facility; HVAC systems are the most common concern otherwise
