Proposal summary:

Friendship PCS proposes the following amendments to its charter agreement to correct addresses, consolidate program offerings, and provide better tutoring and drop-in locations for online academic support.

- 1. Change the address for the Friendship PCS Southeast facility to 2715 Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue SE. The facility name is Friendship PCS Southeast.
- 2. Restore, as an administrative correction, the facility located at 620 Milwaukee Place SE (formerly the location for Friendship PCS Technology Preparatory Middle) to our charter agreement as an auxiliary site for Friendship Southeast Elementary campus and Friendship Southeast Middle campus. The facility name is Friendship PCS Southeast Annex.
- 3. Consolidate Friendship PCS Ideal Elementary and Ideal Middle into 6130 North Capitol Street NW. This facility can accommodate both campuses given the recent addition to this facility. The facility name is Friendship PCS Ideal.
- 4. Repurpose the Friendship PCS Ideal swing space (former Hope Tolson at 6200 Kansas Avenue NE) as the tutoring and drop-in location for Friendship online scholars (Friendship K-8 Online and Friendship Collegiate Online). The facility name is Friendship PCS Online Annex.

5. How will the new location impact current students? How will the school encourage student re-enrollment? How will the school support students in need of transportation to the new location?

The proposed changes will better support Friendship PCS students by ensuring that students have access to newly renovated facilities that better support academic programming.

For the Friendship PCS - Southeast facility, the address change represents consolidating under one address the original Friendship Southeast facility with the newly built Friendship Southeast facility addition. These buildings are connected so that students can flow seamlessly from one side of the building to the other and have access to new classrooms, science labs, gym space and collaboration spaces. As the site remains the same, we anticipate no negative impacts on re-enrollment or transportation. Positive impacts include better facilities that students, families and staff desired and better drop-off and pickup.

For the Friendship PCS - Southeast annex, restoring the address to our charter reflects its use as an auxiliary space for counseling, athletics, clubs and other extra- and co-curricular functions. As this site is immediately adjacent to Friendship PCS - Southeast and Friendship PCS - Tech Prep, no impact is expected on re-enrollment or transportation.

For the Friendship PCS - Ideal facility, the consolidation into one address represents merging the original Friendship Ideal location (taken over from Ideal PCS in 2019) with the recently constructed addition on the same site. With the new addition and

significant renovation to the original premises, students have access to larger, more appropriate classrooms, an Arts wing, new science labs, an acceleration and advanced learning suite and large athletic/gym space. As the site remains the same, we anticipate no negative impacts on re-enrollment or transportation. Positive impacts include better facilities that students, families and staff desire.

For the Friendship PCS - Online annex, students will have an additional, improved location for drop-in academic tutoring, supplemental support, testing and enrichment. FPCS Online scholars have historically traveled to various Friendship campuses for testing, in-person support, enrichment, and special events as the current location only has eight modular classrooms but the annex has a cafeteria, multipurpose room/gym, library and outdoor space. We anticipate no negative impacts on re-enrollment or transportation. Friendship already offers transportation support for online scholars through scheduled buses, rideshare services, and will continue to do so for the current location and the annex.

6. Will there be newly created seats for additional students? If so, discuss student recruitment efforts in the new school community.

There will not be newly created seats for additional students. The amendment seeks to provide better facilities for current enrollment.

7. What is the maximum occupancy at the new location? If the maximum occupancy load for staff and students is less than the total number of staff and students who will occupy the facility at any point in the future, please explain how you will address this issue.

Friendship will operate within the approved occupancy limits for all facilities referenced in this amendment application based on the following occupancy loads.

- 2715 Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue SE (Cert of Occupancy max 1,240)
- 620 Milwaukee Place SE (Cert of Occupancy max 267)
- 6130 North Capitol NW (Cert of Occupancy max 802)
- 6200 Kansas Avenue NE (Cert of Occupancy max 650)
- 8. Does the proposed space require renovation? If so, describe the renovations the new location will need, either to serve as a school or to be accessible for students with disabilities.

No renovations are required.

9. Describe the proposed facility's neighborhood (i.e., is it residential or commercial, is it metro accessible). What value will the school add to the proposed neighborhood?

The Friendship PCS - Southeast and Friendship PCS Southeast Annex facilities are located in the Congress Heights neighborhood, which are accessible by metro bus and metro train. While primarily residential, the facilities sit just off of a main street, Martin Luther King Avenue, which includes commercial property along the main street with St. Elizabeth's, Cedar Hill Hospital and the Entertainment and Sports Arena across the street. The newly constructed addition adds value through better pick-up and drop off access, better curb appeal and improved streetscaping. The Friendship PCS - Ideal facility and Friendship PCS - Online annex are located in the Lamond Riggs community, a primarily residential community though there are a few warehouse/industrial commercial buildings nearby. Friendship has been a stable, active and vibrant presence in the community. We've also improved the facilities through extensive renovation, including replacing a dilapidated, eyesore warehouse with a much improved school addition. As with other Friendship campuses, this site provides playgrounds, gardens, meeting spaces, and other amenities that are accessible for community use.

10. List the traditional and public charter schools near the new location, identifying schools that educate the same grade span your school serves/will serve. Describe how the school's mission and academic performance compare to these schools. What impact will the school's relocation have on enrollment at neighboring schools?

N/A. The locations are not new. We intend to serve our existing enrollment in facilities that we already own and control and, therefore, anticipate little impact on enrollment of nearby schools. While we don't believe this question applies, for reference we are listing schools under a mile away.

11. When did the school hold an open board of trustees meeting to discuss the proposed change(s)?

Thursday, May 15, 2025 during the regularly scheduled meeting of the Friendship Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees passed a resolution granting Friendship Administration permission to pursue the charter amendment.

12. Describe how the school has engaged its internal community in its decision to relocate or expand into the proposed location. Submit documentation of the school's communications with its staff and families regarding the proposed space. Identify the internal community's concerns and how the school is responding to their needs.

Friendship has had numerous engagements with internal community members on offering improved facilities for Friendship PCS - Ideal, Friendship PCS - Southeast and Friendship PCS - Online annex. For Friendship PCS - Southeast facility, students, parents, staff and board had opportunities to tour and give feedback on program spaces. For Friendship PCS - Online annex, school leaders engaged in planning at a retreat on June 16-17, 2025, sharing their excitement for strengthening the in-person programmatic support for online students across all grades.

Additionally, Friendship surveyed middle school caregivers in our Ward 4 and 5 schools. Ninety-three percent of families indicated a desire to continue to attend or to learn more. The features they are most interested in for their children include college and career readiness, leadership and internship opportunities, social emotional support, access to counseling, and dual enrollment and AP courses.

- **13. Describe how the school has engaged the community surrounding the proposed location.** Please attach documentation of communications with nearby principals, neighbors, ANC representatives, Councilmembers, and other community groups, notifying them of the school's plans.
 - a. When did the school inform the ANC representatives of its facility plans? Has the school already presented its facility plans during an ANC meeting? If not, when will it do so?

For 6200 Kansas Avenue NE, which we plan to use for the Friendship PCS - Online annex, Friendship notified the Chairperson of ANC 4B as well as the Single-Member District Commissioner on May 1, 2025, regarding its plans in writing. The notification included a

request to be added to an ANC meeting agenda to present the school's facility plans, to answer questions, and to hear feedback from the community. Friendship PCS attended the ANC 4B meeting on June 23, sharing our plan, answering questions, and responding to community concerns. Attendees had questions about the school size, the number of staff, and the availability of off-street parking for additional staff. We adapted our planning to be responsive to the community. Friendship is scheduled to attend the ANC 4B meeting on September 13, 2025 where we anticipate receiving official support from the members.

Additionally, Friendship sent information regarding this charter amendment to DCPS and PCS school leaders in Ward 4, the Ward 4 SBOE representative, Ward 4 DC Councilmember, the leader of the Ward 4 Education Council, The Lamond-Riggs Neighborhood Association, and faith leaders in the Ward 4 community.

b. Summarize the external community's concerns, if any, and describe the school's response with specificity.

For 6200 Kansas Avenue NE, the primary concerns of the ANC have been related to off-street parking for school staff. Friendship has multiple parking lots on its existing campus with parking spaces expanded when we completed the addition. We expect this will be sufficient for additional staff. We are committed to working with the ANC and local community to mitigate any impacts on local residents.

Cathy Riley leads the Ward 4 Education Council. She is deeply committed to by-right neighborhood schools with the resources needed to educate students. She expressed concerns about enrollment patterns and the impact of enrollment shifts as a result of this new site. Friendship is mitigating these concerns by focusing efforts on existing Friendship students and by planning to utilize the site as mentioned earlier.

MINUTES

Board of Trustees Meeting

Thursday, May 15, 2025 – 9:30 AM In-Person and Zoom Meeting

Participating Board Members were: Donald L. Hense, Chair; Dr. Gregory S. Prince, Jr., Vice-Chair; Patricia Brantley, Chief Executive Officer; Carol Thompson Cole, Anise Walker, and Chris White participated in person. Unique Fullmore, Eric McKinley King, and Jeanette Mendes participated via Zoom.

Staff Members in attendance were: Catherine Somefun, Chief Financial Officer; Vielka Scott-Marcus, Chief Academic Officer; James Waller, Chief of School Operations; Zac Morford, Chief Performance Officer; John Glover, Chief of External Affairs; Dylan Gruver, Chief People Officer; Kimberly Campbell, Senior Advisor; Sue P. White, Director of STEM; and Monique Miller, Director of Performance Reporting and Evaluation.

Call to Order. The meeting was called to order by Donald L. Hense, Chair at 9:33 AM.

Approval of the Agenda. Donald L. Hense, Chair amended the agenda to start with the Nominations and Governance Update. On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Mr. Hense, the Board voted unanimously by roll call vote to approve the amended agenda.

Nominations and Governance Update. Carol Thompson Cole, Chair of the Nominations and Governance Committee presented Sue P. White as the nominee for the Friendship PCS Board of Trustees. Mrs. Thompson Cole stated that Ms. White would succeed former trustee, Tracy Gray. On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Chris White the Board voted unanimously by roll call vote to approve the nomination of Sue P. White to serve as a member of the Friendship PCS – Board of Trustees.

Approval of Minutes. On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Chris White, the Board voted unanimously by roll call to approve the minutes from the March 28, 2025 board meeting.

Finance Update. Catherine Somfeun introduced and reviewed the report accepted by members of the Finance Committee. Ms. Somefun began the SY 2024-25 financial update with a review of the balance sheet. Friendship's third quarter year-to-date net income is \$5.3M and has strong liquidity with \$67M in cash, which translates to 176 days cash on hand.

Mrs. Somefun moved to the year-over-comparison and noted an \$8.3M increase in per pupil revenue driven by increases in the UPSFF by 12.4% and Facilities Allotment by 3.1%. The decrease in grants is primarily due to the discontinuance of ESSR and one-time OSSE teacher Pay support. On the expense side, savings were achieved by bringing some academic services n house and expenses remained stable in all other areas.

Mrs. Somefun stated that Friendship's revenue forecast is \$279K above budget. Expenses align with what was budgeted at the beginning of the school year and support Friendship's academic priorities and long-term viability.

Mrs. Somefun reviewed key performance indicators that include days of cash, gross margin, debt-to-asset ratio and forecasted FAR, and closed the FY 2024-25 financial update by covering reserve balances. Mrs. Somefun stated Friendship will meet all bond covenants with required reserves fully funded based on requirements and that Friendship will meet S&P medians for BBB rated charter schools. Pat Brantley noted that we are continuing to responsibility increase our days cash on hand and reserves that are commensurate with the size of our organization.

Mrs. Somefun transitioned to the review of the FY 2025-26 budget and stated that it is conservative and strategic and does not reflect the Mayor's proposed increases. Instead, the budget revenue is based on current UPSFF levels and will cover all expenses, meet debt obligations, and fund required reserves. Ms. Brantley noted the budget presented is Friendship's contingency budget that assumes we do not receive the increases and the full budget that assumes that we do. Ms. Brantley then asked the board to review and approve the full budget knowing that built in, is a contingency if funding remains flat. It will require some support coming out of reserves. Mr. Hense requested that Ms. Brantley call a board meeting via Zoom to update the Board and review Friendship's budget once we receive concrete numbers.

On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Chris White the Board voted unanimously by roll call to accept the Finance Committee Report and approve the FY 2025-26 Budget as presented.

Mrs. Somefun provided an update on the FY 2025 audit and Friendship's 403(b). Friendship engaged Maner Costerisan for the FY 2024-25 audit. Fieldwork is scheduled to begin September 12th and a first draft of the audit is expected by October 12th. Mrs. Somefun provided an overview of Friendship's 403(b) that included an employer contribution of a 50% match of employee contribution up to 6% of compensation. The plan is compliant with ERISA and IRS requirements, it has 1,008 participants, and the total fund balance is \$26M.

School Performance Update. Gregory Prince, Co-Chair of the School Performance Committee introduced the report approved by members of the Committee and Vielka Scott-Marcus led the presentation of the report. Mrs. Scott-Marcus provided an overview of the report, which included an update on the process of our schools with information about the Graduate Profile, updates on the Class of 2025, selected ASPIRE measures, and other updates. Our Class of 2025 have been awarded \$23M in college scholarships that include full scholarships from the Gates Scholarship and American University. Friendship's CLASS results exceeded the ASPIRE target of 6 in the Emotional Support and Classroom Organization domains and four of six campuses exceeded the target of four for the Instructional Support domain.

Mrs. Scott-Marcus shared some of the colleges Friendship seniors have committed to attend as part of National College Decision Day; the list includes Duke, Temple, Spelman, Morehouse, the Naval Academy, Howard University, Virginia Tech, Hampton, and Georgetown among others. Mrs. Scott-Marcus also provided examples from the third quarter of how Friendship students

exemplify the Graduate Profile attributes that include students engaging with At-Large Councilmember Robert White (Community Focused) and a student winning first place in an oratory competition (Effective Communicators). Mrs. Scott-Marcus shared four and six-year graduation rates and noted that our rates exceed DC's six-year rate for the Class of 2017. Mrs. Scott-Marcus shared data and information related to the ASPIRE system. Board of Trustees Meeting

Thursday, May 15, 2025 – 9:30 AM In-Person and Zoom Meeting

White, Director of STEM; and Monique Miller, Director of Performance Reporting and Evaluation.

Call to Order. The meeting was called to order by Donald L. Hense, Chair at 9:33 AM.

Approval of the Agenda. Donald L. Hense, Chair amended the agenda to start with the Nominations and Governance Update. On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Mr. Hense, the Board voted unanimously by roll call vote to approve the amended agenda.

Nominations and Governance Update. Carol Thompson Cole, Chair of the Nominations and Governance Committee presented Sue P. White as the nominee for the Friendship PCS Board of Trustees. Mrs. Thompson Cole stated that Ms. White would succeed former trustee, Tracy Gray. On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Chris White the Board voted unanimously by roll call vote to approve the nomination of Sue P. White to serve as a member of the Friendship PCS – Board of Trustees.

Approval of Minutes. On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Chris White, the Board voted unanimously by roll call to approve the minutes from the March 28, 2025 board meeting.

Finance Update. Catherine Somfeun introduced and reviewed the report accepted by members of the Finance Committee. Ms. Somefun began the SY 2024-25 financial update with a review of the balance sheet. Friendship's third quarter year-to-date net income is \$5.3M and has strong liquidity with \$67M in cash, which translates to 176 days cash on hand.

Mrs. Somefun moved to the year-over-comparison and noted an \$8.3M increase in per pupil revenue driven by increases in the UPSFF by 12.4% and Facilities Allotment by 3.1%. The decrease in grants is primarily due to the discontinuance of ESSR and one-time OSSE teacher Pay support. On the expense side, savings were achieved by bringing some academic services n house and expenses remained stable in all other areas.

Mrs. Somefun stated that Friendship's revenue forecast is \$279K above budget. Expenses align with what was budgeted at the beginning of the school year and support Friendship's academic priorities and long-term viability.

Mrs. Somefun reviewed key performance indicators that include days of cash, gross margin, debt-to-asset ratio and forecasted FAR, and closed the FY 2024-25 financial update by covering reserve balances. Mrs. Somefun stated Friendship will meet all bond covenants with required reserves fully funded based on requirements and that Friendship will meet S&P medians for BBB rated charter schools. Pat Brantley noted that we are continuing to responsibility increase our days cash on hand and reserves that are commensurate with the size of our organization.

Mrs. Somefun transitioned to the review of the FY 2025-26 budget and stated that it is conservative and strategic and does not reflect the Mayor's proposed increases. Instead, the budget revenue is based on current UPSFF levels and will cover all expenses, meet debt obligations, and fund required reserves. Ms. Brantley noted the budget presented is Friendship's contingency budget that assumes we do not receive the increases and the full budget that assumes that we do. Ms. Brantley then asked the board to review and approve the full budget knowing that built in, is a contingency if funding remains flat. It will require some support coming out of reserves. Mr. Hense requested that Ms. Brantley call a board meeting via Zoom to update the Board and review Friendship's budget once we receive concrete numbers.

On a motion by Gregory S. Prince, Jr. and second by Chris White the Board voted unanimously by roll call to accept the Finance Committee Report and approve the FY 2025-26 Budget as presented.

Mrs. Somefun provided an update on the FY 2025 audit and Friendship's 403(b). Friendship engaged Maner Costerisan for the FY 2024-25 audit. Fieldwork is scheduled to begin September 12th and a first draft of the audit is expected by October 12th. Mrs. Somefun provided an overview of Friendship's 403(b) that included an employer contribution of a 50% match of employee contribution up to 6% of compensation. The plan is compliant with ERISA and IRS requirements, it has 1,008 participants, and the total fund balance is \$26M.

School Performance Update. Gregory Prince, Co-Chair of the School Performance Committee introduced the report approved by members of the Committee and Vielka Scott-Marcus led the presentation of the report. Mrs. Scott-Marcus provided an overview of the report, which included an update on the process of our schools with information about the Graduate Profile, updates on the Class of 2025, selected ASPIRE measures, and other updates. Our Class of 2025 have been awarded \$23M in college scholarships that include full scholarships from the Gates Scholarship and American University. Friendship's CLASS results exceeded the ASPIRE target of 6 in the Emotional Support and Classroom Organization domains and four of six campuses exceeded the target of four for the Instructional Support domain.

Mrs. Scott-Marcus shared some of the colleges Friendship seniors have committed to attend as part of National College Decision Day; the list includes Duke, Temple, Spelman, Morehouse, the Naval Academy, Howard University, Virginia Tech, Hampton, and Georgetown among others. Mrs. Scott-Marcus also provided examples from the third quarter of how Friendship students

exemplify the Graduate Profile attributes that include students engaging with At-Large Councilmember Robert White (Community Focused) and a student winning first place in an oratory competition (Effective Communicators). Mrs. Scott-Marcus shared four and six-year graduation rates and noted that our rates exceed DC's six-year rate for the Class of 2017. Mrs. Scott-Marcus shared data and information related to the ASPIRE system. My name is John Glover and I am the Chief of External Affairs for Friendship Public Charter School. Friendship has educated children in Washington, D.C. for over 25 years and currently serves 4,300 students across 15 campuses in DC. We have students who live in all eight wards, and we operate school sites in Wards 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. We are proud of the work we do in Ward 4 at Friendship Ideal operating a traditional elementary middle program. Ward 4 is also the physical home for Friendship Online and serves as a landing place for online students to come for tutoring, clubs and other supports. We are grateful to be part of a vibrant community of excellent Ward 4 schools.

I am writing to share an important update about Friendship's intention to submit a charter amendment request to the DC Public Charter School Board. If approved, Friendship would begin to operate a satellite location of Friendship Collegiate High School at 6200 Kansas Ave NE – a location already in use by Friendship as a school. The primary reason for this change would be to provide students already enrolled in Friendship Online and Friendship Collegiate online with a brick-and-mortar location for instruction, testing, collaboration, and community building – critical parts of our online program that happen from time to time throughout the year.
