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Background

Created in 1996, the DC Public Charter School Board (DC PCSB) is an independent government agency of the District of Columbia that provides academic and financial oversight to 128 citywide public charter schools that are managed by 66 independently-run nonprofit organizations called local education agencies (LEA).

As the sole public charter school authorizer in Washington, DC, our role is different from that of a school district. We do not operate or direct the management of public charter schools. That is the job of each school's board of trustees. Instead we ensure all students and families have access to a quality public charter school education.

As I wrap up my tenure on the DC Public Charter School Board, I'm proud of the record we have established. Public charter schools in Washington, DC have a nationwide reputation for innovation - and for providing educational options to students and families.

This has come about because of an intentional strategy by the DC Public Charter School Board to focus on quality and equity by approving new schools and expanding campuses that reflect the needs of the DC community.

In the past three years alone, we have approved several innovative school models - like computer science, bilingual, single-sex, and Montessori -

that have created differentiated options for families, especially for those students who have been historically marginalized.

We have also closed underperforming schools that were not serving our students well. Since 2014 when I joined the Board, we have opened 21 schools while closing 15. We want more families at the top-rated schools so that a higher percentage of charter students can get the best education.

While there's much more that needs to be done to strengthen public education in the city, I'm pleased we've made good on this promise. We must continue to innovate in order to make public charter schools even better - because students and families deserve our best.



Over time, the face of charter schools has changed. More and more are being led by leaders of color - backed up by strong boards of trustees, who themselves increasingly represent the diversity and expertise that DC has to offer. These are critical elements to the schools' long-term success.

Washington, DC is a thriving, growing city. The resources and commitment - even as we emerge from the public health pandemic - exist to make our charter and traditional schools a model for the nation.

While my term on the Board will end in 2022, I'll continue to cheer for the success of public education and advocate for all families to have access to high quality school options. When I look back on this amazing civic opportunity afforded me, it will be measured not in meetings attended or schools visited, but in the number of students whose experience of education and pathways to opportunity have been transformed by the choices available to them in our city.

Impact of COVID-19

The COVID-19 public health emergency resulted in all DC public charter schools physically closing and implementing distance learning programs in March 2020. DC PCSB adopted its COVID-19 policy to clearly articulate changes in the implementation of policies and practices impacted by school buildings closing. The policy was revised in December 2020 and again in July 2021 to include additional changes to DC PCSB's oversight and accountability practices.

- With the state assessment not administered this year, DC PCSB outlined how schools will be held accountable in charter review and renewal reports that are conducted through SY 2023-24.
- DC PCSB will collect data for a school's SY 2020-21 charter goals and academic achievement expectations but will not use the data to evaluate goal attainment.
- DC PCSB will display the data for school's goals in the review and renewal reports for SY 2020-21 and the data may be used by the Board as discretionary evidence, but only if it helps the school.
- DC PCSB will include relevant written narrative and context from the school when 2020-21 goal data is publicly reported.

Additionally, due to the cancellation of the state assessment, DC PCSB will not publish the School Quality Report (also known as the Performance Management Framework, or PMF) for SY 2020-21.



The Qualitative Site Review

The purpose of the Qualitative Site Review (QSR) is to provide DC PCSB, public charter school leaders, and other community members with qualitative evidence to complement the quantitative evidence used for determining charter continuance at high stakes reviews.

The QSR is intended to provide a snapshot of overall quality, not to evaluate individual teachers. DC PCSB conducts unannounced school visits and selects a random sample of classrooms. DC PCSB does not typically observe electives but will observe an elective class if it is critical to the school's mission. While DC PCSB may note general trends across grade levels or subject areas, the QSR team will not give recommendations or share individual observation results. The QSR team produces a final report containing a qualitative assessment for each campus within the Local Education Agency (LEA).

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, all QSRs during school year (SY) 2020-21 were conducted remotely.* Additionally, DC PCSB elected to summarize the overall findings from the observations using specific examples that apply to each indicator of the rubric, rather than assess individual scores and percentages for each domain.

QSRs are comprised of the following components:

- a. A pre-visit meeting with school leaders to gather information about the school's mission, vision, academic program, and charter goals;
- b. A review of student English language arts (ELA) and math and work samples;
- c. Unannounced observations of synchronous (live) remote instruction;² and
- d. Scheduled debrief with the school leadership team and DC PCSB staff.





SY 2020-21 Public Charter School Enrollment Data



% of PCS Students Enrolled by Grade Band




Discipline Data

If we exclude Adult and PK students from the above, the SY 2019-20 charter sector OSS rate through March 13 was 5.5%.


2021 Graduations

For the Class of 2021, some graduations remained virtual while others hosted in-person ceremonies. We congratulated the Class of 2021 by highlighting students in our 2021 Senior Spotlight social media campaign. Students shared what they will miss most about high school and their plans after graduation.

Monitoring

We monitor the financial health and management of our schools through three primary tools: (1) the annual Financial Analysis Report, which provides a comprehensive assessment of each school's financial health, based on audited financial statements; (2) a review of the annual budget for each school's operations; (3) a review of interim financial statements, either quarterly or monthly, including a Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Activities, and Statement of Cash Flows.

Additionally, schools undergo an in-depth review of their financial health and management as part of their 5-Year and 10-Year Reviews and 15-Year Renewals.


Transparency

In addition to our Financial Analysis Report, we post school budgets, tax returns, at-risk spending plans, and audited financial statements to our website. Audited financials include a supplemental schedule that lists all school contracts entered into during the fiscal year that are worth more than \$25,000 per year.

Interventions

If we have concerns about a school's financial health, we collaborate with the school to address them as early as possible. In most cases, we start with two interventions: (1) additional monitoring, including more frequent interim financial statement reviews and budget revisions; and (2) informal discussions of the school's financial challenges and plans for improvement. In cases of more imminent concerns, we may take more formal actions, such as raising our concerns at a public board meeting, citing a school for fiscal mismanagement, or instituting a Financial Corrective Action Plan, which sets specific performance targets for the school's finances.



Parent Alumni Leadership Council (PALC)

PALC met on 10 occasions between August 2020 and July 2021. Parents met to discuss virtual learning and current DC PCSB initiatives. This year, PALC offered input on our first-ever Strategic Roadmap, PALC policy, charter goals, school tracking on in-person, virtual and hybrid learning, financial reporting, new charter school applications, and communication to families. Members also spent time during each meeting sharing their experience with virtual learning and navigating parenting during the pandemic.

New Schools Playbook

The Planning Year Playbook is to provide conditionally-approved schools with the knowledge, resources, and experiences of past new school leaders to have a successful school opening. The playbook seeks to provide new schools with practical 'how-to' guidance.

Teach DC: Teacher Recruitment Fair

In April 2021, DC PCSB worked with EdFuel, and the DME to host the 2nd annual DC Citywide Virtual Recruitment Fair to help schools recruit new educators. More than 40 public charter and DC Public school leaders spent time during the two-day fair meeting with hundreds of quality teaching candidates.

Working with Government Agencies

DC PCSB and Office of the Deputy Mayor for Education (DME) Safe Reopening Listening Sessions DC PCSB and the DME led 12 community listening conversations with more than 160 parents, students, and teachers to help inform the District's recovery efforts.

DC PCSB + OSSE Partnering with LEA's Through the Pandemic

DC PCSB and OSSE brought together public charter and traditional school leaders for 17 months, since March 2020 to June 2021, to find ways to share best practices and bring cross agency presenters together to share information and address concerns.

More than 70 webinars were held with public charter and tradition school leaders to discuss topics such as access to vaccines for teachers and staff, creating a sharing library to provide schools with resources related to distance learning, special populations, and communications, DC PCSB's new accountability framework, and more.

Working with Partners

Sharing Proven Authorizing Approaches

Our staff shared practices at the 2020 National Association of Charter School Authorizers Leadership Conference Sessions. We shared about our innovative approach to attendance collection and our role in family engagement in the wake of the pandemic.



Working with Community

Community Meetings with the New Executive Director (Wards 4,5,6,7,8)

During the search process for the new DC PCSB executive director, we heard repeatedly from the community their desire to meet with the individual selected early in their tenure. Executive Director Dr. Michelle J. Walker-Davis, met with residents in Wards 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 and she met with Advisory Neighborhood Commisions (ANCs) in every ward public charter schools are located to discuss her 120 day priorities as the organization's leader. These meetings were attended by school leaders, ANCs, students, families, and more.

EdFEST 2020

In December of 2020, DC PCSB participated in virtual EdFEST 2020 to help students and families explore the city's public and public charter school options (PK – 12).

Community Engagement

DC PCSB attends multiple community meetings throughout the year to hear input on issues related to public charter schools. DC PCSB has met about school parking zones, accelerated learning, safe passage, student safety, and school reopening through this work.

ANC Conversations

As schools began to return to in-person learning in the spring, DC PCSB held meetings to connect schools with the ANC's in their ward. ANC's are non-partisan, neighborhood bodies made up of locally elected representatives called Advisory Neighborhood Commissioners. ANC's help connect the community to the government by providing information to local lawmakers. More than 30 ANCs met with public charter school leaders to discuss new ways to work together and strengthen their partnership.
